

Developing patient and family feedback surveys at an urban pediatric gender care center: A quality improvement project

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Introduction:

- An urban gender care center (GCC) in the Northwestern United States with rapid expansion since opening in 2014
- With their increasing volume of patients, little available time and provider capacity to elicit patient and family feedback
- The providers & staff expressed need for standardized surveys to be developed & distributed to their patient population and families to gather information about the clinic & identify areas of improvement.

Purpose/Aims:

- Goal: Gather feedback on provider care and clinic processes from patients and caregivers via two respective surveys.
- Aim: Improve patient & family satisfaction by identifying areas necessitating change to improve patient and family care


Methods:


Develop patient and familyspecific feedback surveys at 1 pediatric GCC over 5 months

Distribute surveys via QR codes to GCC patients and families for a 5-month period of data collection

Thematic analyze used to identify trends and isolate areas of potential improvement in the GCC

Demographics of Patients & Caregiver at GCC:

Participants		Attendance (years)	Survey score

Child	1 (10%)	4	4
(< 13 years	(<13 yrs)		
Adolescents	9 (90%)	1.3 (0.6 to 5 yr.)	3.8 (1 to 5)
(>13 years)	(range 15-19 yr.)		
Caregiver			
Mothers	6 (75%)	1.4 (0.2 – 4 yr.)	4.6 (3-5)

Conclusions:

- Patients (regardless of age):
 - Positive about the care they received
- Caregivers:
 - Positive about anticipatory guidance
 - Desired more mental health resources for their child/adolescent
- Due to small sample size, saturation may not have been fully obtained
- Limited survey response made it difficult to identify consistent trends

Implications:

- Results reveal positive experiences for patients and caregivers with similar areas identified for continued improvement
- Future data will help clarify additional areas that may benefit from provider changes in practice when caring for transgender and gender diverse youth
- Goal: Continued usage of the survey in the clinic
